



Welcome guests, fellow Trustees, sponsors, students, and justly proud families to this very, VERY special evening! Tonight, NMSA celebrates several extraordinary milestones:

- NMSA will open the doors of its brand-new campus this August to the first students who will begin and close their high school careers at the new school.
- NMSA will welcome a record-breaking 254 students.
- NMSA will launch fifth full arts major, Creative Writing & Literature, this August.
- The New Mexico State Legislature approved capital outlay funding of \$4,257,500 to help us build the next phase of the new campus, a cafeteria and a residential dormitory.

NMSA has a proven track record of developing and providing exceptional opportunities to youth who may otherwise not have access to them. The opening of its own campus solidifies NMSA as an important part of the educational landscape of New Mexico.

These milestones complement the honors that NMSA students has earned won over the last year:

- The Class of 2019 has received \$6.7 million in scholarships offers.
- NMSA's graduation rate is 98%!
- NMSA seniors were accepted, to many distinguished colleges and universities: Johns Hopkins University, New York University-Tisch School of the Arts, Rhode Island School of Design, University of New Mexico, the School of the Art Institute of Chicago, Maryland Institute College of Art, California Institute of the Arts, New Mexico State University, Institute of American Indian Arts and St. John's College.

Over the last several years, both of us have served NMSA, its students, and its mission in different ways: Ned as Chair of the Board of Trustees, and Bill as Chair of the Governing Council. It has been our honor and privilege to serve in these capacities alongside deeply committed and generous colleagues.

NMSA's successes have always been a team effort, and they will continue to be, as the Board of Trustees, Governing Council, NMSA's devoted staff, parents, and faculty, and those incredible and talented students, together show what the power of a dream can create.

Board Spotlight Ned Bennett

"Most people have a bucket list of things they wish they had done – I don't have one. I always strived to do everything I ever wanted to do."

There was never a challenge too great or any objective too insurmountable for Ned Bennett. With the right combination of determination, moxie and entrepreneurial spirit, Ned has built an outstanding legacy of excellence. "Most people have a bucket list of things they wish they had done – I don't have one. I always strived to do everything I ever wanted to do.", he said.

Over the course of his professional life, Ned has had careers in several different fields: Education, Public Assembly, Gold Sales, and, most recently, Online Stock Brokerage. After operating a technical college in Columbus Ohio, Ned moved to the Pacific Northeast and became the Vice President of the Cape Cod Coloseum, where he presented the venue's first concerts, hosting renowned artists: from Arthur Fiedler and the Boston Pops to Aerosmith, and George Winston. Ned went on to open the Mid-Hudson Civic Center in Poughkeepsie, New York and, among many other ventures, continued to present concerts there.

Shifting career paths, Ned then moved into gold sales, as he had always had a fascination with gold and precious metals. Following great success in that field, Ned founded his own '.com' startup: Options Express. Options Express was one of the financial sector's first 100% online, full-service stock brokerages. The website automated the management of stock portfolios, offering all the services a floor-broker provided. The company received the top star rating for four consecutive years from Barron's ratings and, after going public, was ultimately merged with the Charles Schwab Corporation.

Ned's interest in and support for the arts is personal as well as philosophical: he is an avid saxophonist and took lessons at Chicago's Bloom Institute of Jazz during the complex start-up phase of Options Express. Ned would take reprieves, while working long into nights with website developers and business partners, to woodshed on his instrument and practice standards. "Music has always been an important part of my life", he said, along with marriage." Ned is very proud to have been married for over 40 years to artist and gallerist, Sandy Zane. The two have not only shared success as business partners, forming a 100% online art sales business – Zane Bennet Contemporary Art – but also share passions for the arts and aviation. Sandy and Ned are both excellent pilots and have been flying together, all over the country, for many years. Ned, himself, has been flying privately for over 50 years.

Ned has served as the Chair of the New Mexico School for the Arts – Art Institute Board of Trustees for the past seven years. He is "impressed by the makeup of our Board and [is] very honored just to be one of them. The sheer amount of money that we have raised demonstrates how committed our donors are to NMSA's students."

We extend our deepest gratitude to Ned Bennett for his dedicated service and leadership from the early days of NMSA through the completion of the Phase 1 construction project for the new campus.



Governing Council Spotlight

Gregory Hunt

Gregory Hunt, who serves as the Treasurer of the Governing Council of New Mexico School for the Arts, is a public service veteran, with more than 30 years of commitment to New Mexico and the Santa Fe Public Schools. Shortly after graduating in 1965 from the College of Santa Fe, Hunt began his career in accounting as the Assistant Business Manager for the College. He then moved into the public sector for the New Mexico Department of Human Services, where he served for 25 years, eventually becoming Chief of the Report Section. Later, Hunt became Budget Manager for Santa Fe Public Schools, where he worked tirelessly to advocate for school employees.

According to Hunt, NMSA co-founders Cindy Montoya and Catherine Oppenheimer reached out to him "out of the blue" to become a founding member of NMSA's Governing Council. With only one short hiatus from the Council during his nine-year tenure, Hunt has continued to play an integral role in NMSA's leadership.

Hunt loves to travel and is a patron of the arts in Santa Fe, attending performances at the Lensic Performing Arts Center and The Santa Fe Opera. In fact, Hunt worked as a stage hand at the Greer Garson Theatre in college and worked his way up in production management. Whether backstage or balancing books, Hunt has always strived for excellence – a quality that has distinguished his service to New Mexico School for the Arts over the years.

Paula Tackett

"So many talented young people weren't able to access this kind of training before NMSA."

Born and raised in Albuquerque, Paula Tackett graduated with a degree in History from the University of New Mexico. After spending four years in Washington, DC, operating an experimental foreign exchange program, Tackett returned to her alma mater to earn a law degree. Afterward, Tackett worked in the Santa Fe office of the New Mexico Court of

Appeals under Judge Ramon Lopez before moving into private practice with the White Coch Kelly McCarthy Law Firm: the firm's first female attorney.

Tackett later returned to public service, where she stayed till retiring, spending twenty-eight years working for the State of New Mexico, eventually becoming the Director of the Legislative Counsel Service.

Tackett was invited to visit New Mexico School for the Arts by former Art Institute Executive Director, Riis Gonzales. As she walked through the halls, Tackett remembers, "Those kids made my heart sing." She promptly joined the Governing Council and went on to play a pivotal role in guiding the legislative and legal processes connected with NMSA's growth and mission, as well as the construction of the new campus.

"What is remarkable about the school is that kids who haven't had the opportunity for training can still get in and that we do not look at grades, only talent. I always think of this remarkable admissions story: one young woman presented a portfolio clearly demonstrating that she had training in a variety of media. One young man presented a spiral bound notebook with only hand drawings. Both of them got in."

Creative Writing & Literature

CW&L launched as a full major!

We are delighted to announce the addition of a new Creative Writing and Literature (CW&L) curriculum at New Mexico School for the Arts (NMSA). CW&L is the first new arts major to be added to NMSA's arts training program since it opened in 2010 with its original four disciplines, Music, Dance, Theater, and Visual Arts.

On May 3, 2019, the first auditions were held for students seeking admission to NMSA as Creative Writing and Literature majors; twenty students were selected and will begin their studies as CW&L majors in August 2019 – just as the new NMSA campus opens!

Thanks to the generosity of Stephen and Jane Hochberg, this summer NMSA will for the second consecutive year present the Hochberg Summer Creative Writing Workshop. The workshops are an important outreach and adjunct part of NMSA's new creative writing program – they are critical to recruitment for, and awareness of the availability of the new curriculum. In 2018, the Hochberg Workshops reached dozens of young students from Santa Fe, Albuquerque, Carlsbad, Taos, and El Rito.

The new Creative Writing and Literature curriculum owes its inception to the leadership, commitment, and generosity of the late NMSA Trustee, Alicia Metcalf Miller, and Dee Ann McIntyre and the McIntyre Foundation; it was McIntyre who arranged the collaboration between NMSA and the legendary Iowa Writer's Workshop at the University of Iowa at Bloomington. It is due to these supporters that NMSA can now offer aspiring young writers the same in-depth training and mentoring as it does to its performing and visual artists.

Invaluable Partners:

Institute of American Indian Arts & The Lannan Foundation



In 2012, NMSA began partnering with Institute of American Indian Arts (IAIA), a collaboration that was instrumental in the evolution of school's creative writing program. Through this dual-credit program, NMSA students were able to take classes at IAIA and earn a Creative Writing Minor credit. This nurtured several outstanding young writers as the full curriculum was developed. We are grateful to Dr. Martin for his generosity in sharing IAIA's outstanding teachers with NMSA, and for including NMSA students in his commitment to higher learning for all New Mexico youth.

We could not have maintained the Creative Writing Minor at NMSA without the help of The Lannan Foundation: their years of support for the Minor allowed NMSA to dedicate resources to students passionate about creative writing as we sought funding to launch the full Creative Writing and Literature curriculum.

We are delighted to welcome two recent supporters of the Creative Writing and Literature curriculum at NMSA: The Fullwood Foundation and The Stranahan Foundation.



Veronica Toledo is an NMSA residential dormitory student who commutes from the Navajo reservation in Farmington, NM. She views art as a way of healing and a means of expressing ideas. Veronica feels that it is important to show others who she is, and the world she is trying to build, through her works. Veronica feels NMSA has helps her better express herself and allows her the freedom to be who she really is.

Coming to NMSA and living in the dorm was a significant transition for Veronica, who transferred from a private Native American school. She believes that she was "immediately given tools to jot down her ideas and express her own views." This, she says, "helped lay the foundation for [her] to grow [her] artistic soul."

In five years, Veronica sees herself advancing her Native American people, and helping them acquire resources they don't currently have access to. She would like to be a lawyer, and become a voice "for the people that cannot speak for themselves"

As a public school, the majority of public funding is allocated to support NMSA's outstanding academic curriculum, leaving a funding gap of \$2+ million to be raised each year for the mastery arts training curriculum – which provides each student with 2,000 hours of art training every year alongside residential dormitory opportunities and community outreach. At NMSA, academics and arts stand in equal importance, and a student's opportunity to succeed exists because of contributors like you.

Edwina & Charles Milner

Long-time Board Trustee, Edwina Milner, and her husband, Charles Milner, come from humble beginnings. Edwina, born into the Chickasaw Nation during the Great Depression and daughter of an oil driller, moved so often that by the time she left high school she had attended 25 schools. Over the years, out of 25 schools, only one art class was offered – "Music Appreciation".

Edwina still recalls how deep an impression that one music class made on her, despite sensing that her own artistic calling was in the visual arts. Charles, for his part, obtained an M.S. in Petroleum Engineering, and went on to form a consulting firm for independent oil companies. He and Edwina eventually moved to New Mexico, where they were able to focus their attention on causes close to their hearts – education and the arts.

Edwina and Charles know from their own lives how important it is for New Mexico's youth to acquire the basic skills that serve as a foundation for great futures. "New Mexico is one of the poorest states," Edwina acknowledged. "Education is what will bring the state up – we are thrilled with [NMSA's] effectiveness." They admire NMSA's willingness to admit students with a wide range of skill sets in each discipline, and its insistence on complete equality between the academic and arts curricula.

Charles and Edwina agree that after a lifetime of working hard and investing in their companies, they now have the privilege of investing in the long-term future of New Mexico. They also know that it is consistent and stable funding that allows successful models – like NMSA – to seed, establish, and sustain programs that work.

The NMSA Legacy Program was created to offer a channel for supporters who, like Charles and Edwina, want to ensure that NMSA continues to grow and impact the futures of New Mexico's youth, which is why they are thrilled to include the school in their estate planning.






Jacob Sisneros, Visual Arts Faculty

"I think that NMSA is one of the best things to hit Santa Fe and the state as a concept and a school."


Jacob Sisneros was born and raised in the Atrisco neighborhood of Albuquerque's South Valley. He began his studies in Art and Architecture at the University of New Mexico and then graduated with a Bachelor of Fine Arts in Industrial Design from the Rhode Island School of Design. After graduation, Sisneros moved to New York City to teach as the studio manager for the Tim Rollins and Kids of Survival project, an arts collaborative workshop in the South Bronx working with at-risk youth in junior high school and high school.

After several years in New York, Sisneros moved back to New Mexico, where he started his own residential design/build general contracting company, which he operated successfully for 12 years. In 2008, Sisneros transitioned into film art direction and set design, working on many television and movie projects, including the critically-acclaimed series, Longmire. Sisneros, eventually, left his successful career in film art to return to his passion for teaching, and joined the Visual Arts faculty at NMSA, where he has been ever since.

Sisneros believes that, "The acknowledgment of our work by the community is proof that we are doing great things. The support from our Department Chairs and administration is incredible: they empower staff to develop the curriculum and engage with artists in our community. This allows me to be excited about where I teach and to do my best work in the classroom."
